

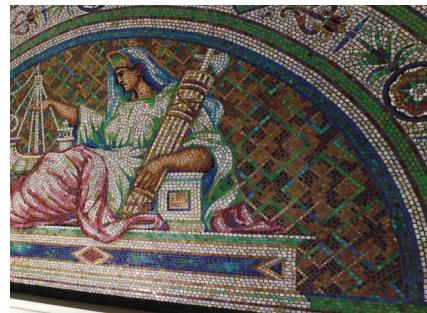
Federal Building and U.S. Courthouse

Indianapolis, IN

The Birch Bayh Federal Building and U.S. Courthouse is a prime example of Beaux Arts architecture. Construction began in 1902 and was completed in 1905. The facility accommodated 925 federal employees in the original U-shaped four story structure that encompassed an entire city block.

In 1936 McGuire & Shook designed an addition expanding the east and west wings and completing the north wing and expanded the existing terrace. This addition of 128,000 square feet continued the Neo-Classic style with Doric columns, richly decorated frieze with decorative entablature and stone balustrade at the roof.

In 1995 OMS undertook a massive renovation/addition project. Included were the reorganization of court facilities to allow for the establishment of two new bankruptcy courts and two magistrate courts, renovation of existing court facilities, relocation of the Justice Department Probation Offices and the U.S. Marshal's Office; replacement of entrance doors, restoration of public corridors; renovation of electrical systems and air conditioning chillers.
